2. Marcus Geisler Appointed EMRC's New CEO



Newly Appointed EMRC CEO Marcus Geisler

Waste Authority Chairman Marcus Geisler has been appointed EMRC's new Chief Executive Officer.

Commencing on 15 July 2019, his appointment was confirmed at a Special Council meeting on Thursday, 30 May 2019 following the resignation of former CEO Peter Schneider in November 2018.

Mr Geisler has extensive experience in the EMRC's principal business of waste management. He has held senior positions in the waste and recycling industry in Australia and overseas with particular emphasis on the recycling of construction and demolition waste.

Mr Geisler has held director and senior management positions

with Coates Hire, Thiess and SITA, Western Australia's largest waste management company. A Waste Authority member since 2008, he was appointed Deputy Chairman in 2011/2012 and has been the Authority's Chairman since 2014.

At the Waste Authority, Mr Geisler's negotiating skills and his commitment to strong engagement successfully brought together State and local governments, industry and the community to enable implementation of the State's Waste Strategy.

His experience in waste processing includes composting organics and alternative waste treatment processes and the recovery and marketing of secondary materials, ranging from construction and demolition waste to kerb side recyclables.

EMRC Chairman Cr David McDonnell thanked Director Regional Services, Wendy Harris for her many valued contributions as Acting CEO over the past six months.

The EMRC is looking forward to the direction Mr Geisler will take to make sure Perth's Eastern Region will be a great place to live, play, work and do business in.

3. Cities Power Partnership

The Cities Power Partnership (CPP) is an Australia-wide Climate Council-led initiative to help councils make the switch to renewable energy. With 100 council members, 17 which are located in WA, the EMRC is represented through five of its six member Councils.

The EMRC attended a Cities Power Partnership in its role of assisting member Councils to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and to better tailor the various programs on offer for member Councils.

The outcome of the day was highly positive with the 21 councils present expressing their endorsement of the state's future objectives. All parties agreed to call for the WA state government to commit to a renewable energy target of 50% by 2030 and 100% emission reduction target by 2050.

4. EMRC's Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Endorsed by Reconciliation Australia

Reconciliation Australia has congratulated the EMRC following endorsement of its inaugural Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).

As a member of the RAP community, the EMRC joins over 1,000 dedicated corporate, government, and not-for-profit organisations that have formally committed to reconciliation through the RAP program since its inception in 2006. RAP organisations across Australia are turning good intentions into positive actions, helping to build higher trust, lower prejudice, and increase pride in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

The EMRC identified a need to develop a RAP to acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who reside or work in Perth's Eastern Region and to develop meaningful



dialogue with those communities to acknowledge the concerns confronting the local community.

The RAP program provides a framework for organisations to advance reconciliation within their spheres of influence. This RAP provides the EMRC a roadmap to begin its reconciliation journey.

Based on international research and benchmarking, Reconciliation Australia defines and measures reconciliation through five critical dimensions: race relations; equality and equity, institutional integrity; unity; and historical acceptance. All sections of the community - governments, civil society, the private sector, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities - have a role to play to progress these dimensions.

Reconciliation Australia CEO Karen Mundine said: "We wish the EMRC well as it takes these first critical steps in its reconciliation journey. We encourage the organisation to embrace this journey with open hearts and minds, to grow from the challenges, and to build on the successes. As the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation reminded the nation in its final report:

"Reconciliation is hard work - it's a long, winding and corrugated road, not a broad, paved highway. Determination and effort at all levels of government and in all sections of the community will be essential to make reconciliation a reality."

She continued: "On behalf of Reconciliation Australia, I commend the EMRC on its first RAP, and look forward to following its ongoing reconciliation journey."

The EMRC is at the very beginning of the reconciliation journey. A RAP Working Party has been formed to develop the RAP and comprises member Council Councillors with support provided by the EMRC's Director Regional Services and the EMRC's Council Support Officer. The Working Party is actively developing the RAP and is committed to ensuring successful implementation of the RAP. Reporting back to Council against the actions and deliverables of the RAP will occur at least annually.

5. Stephen Fitzpatrick – WALGA Honours 2019

EMRC Director Waste Services Stephen (Steve) Fitzpatrick has been selected to receive the WALGA Local Government Distinguished Officer Award. Steve's nomination was for his outstanding contribution and achievements, both professionally and personally, in the advancement of the Local Government sector.

Steve began his career in local government in December 2000 when he was appointed to the role of Manager Project Development at the Eastern Metropolitan Regional Council (EMRC). In August 2013, Steve's dedication and loyalty, as well as his skills and expertise were recognised and led to his promotion to Director Waste Services.

Steve has also provided leadership in developing and implementing a comprehensive Waste Education Strategy, which is used to develop targeted programs with the aim of raising awareness of waste management issues and to motivate behavioural change that results in the reduction of waste. The Waste Education Strategy has been used to implement a number of highly successful programs.

Steve has been instrumental in the establishment of the Waste Management Community Reference Group and Community Taskforce. Both these groups comprise of members of the public who are passionate about waste management. Both these community groups provide valuable input and feedback to the EMRC Council on resource recovery and waste education matters.

The EMRC is very proud of Stephen Fitzpatrick and would like to congratulate him on his welldeserved achievement.

6. 2019/2020 EMRC Community Grants Program

The EMRC is offering grants of up to \$1,500 each to community groups through its 2019/2020 EMRC Community Grants Program.

The program, which opened on Monday, 10 July 2019 with a total pool of \$15,000, provides support to the development or maintenance of the sustainability, social, cultural and/or recreational needs of the local community. Eligible applicants include members of the Gidgegannup, Hovea, Parkerville and/or Stoneville communities.

The EMRC believes that thriving local communities are essential for the wellbeing of those who live there. The EMRC are delighted that we have the opportunity to demonstrate our continued support for our local communities through this valuable initiative.

7. 2019 EMRC Tree Planting Day

21 June 2019 marked the 10 year anniversary of the EMRC Tree Planting Day at the Red Hill Waste Management Facility. Commencing with a Welcome to Country, Bill 'Spud' Caroll enlightened staff on how the tree-planting site had been home to three thousand generations of indigenous culture.

With peak weather conditions, EMRC staff joined forces to personally make a positive environmental impact. Over 50 staff took part in tree planting and together, managed to plant 2,400 native trees in just over an hour.

The tree planting day provides an opportunity for EMRC staff to gain a better understanding of the rehabilitation efforts. The event is a favourite among staff, providing not only a lot of fun but valuable lessons in working together to manage the environment. By the end of the day, EMRC staff achieved a deeper appreciation of the importance of providing a habitat for our native animals.

EMRC's Tree Planting Day is part of the Red Hill Waste Management Facility's rehabilitation program. Environmental sustainability is a high priority for EMRC and the Tree Planting Day is one of many ways the EMRC promotes long-term rehabilitation objectives of the waste facility.
